During this comprehensive tour of Kenya we aimed to find all the country's specials, visiting many remote areas in this quest. Highlights on our eastern loop included Somali Boubou and Malindi Pipit at Lamu, Sokoke Pipit, Clarke's Weaver, Sokoke Scops Owl and Amani Sunbird at Arabuko Sokoke Forest, Violet-breasted Sunbird and Kenya Crested Guineafowl at Tana River Primate Reserve, Steelblue Whydah en route to Tsavo East, Fire-fronted Bishop, Quail Plover and Red-naped Bushshrike in Tsavo East, Tsavo Sunbird, Friedmann's Lark, Pangani Longclaw and Hartlaub's Bustard in the Tsavo West area, and Taita Thrush, Taita Apalis and Taita White-eye in the Taita Hills. Heading north from Nairobi we found Lynes's Cisticola, and Sharpe's Longclaw at Kinangop, then Jackson's Francolin and Aberdare Cisticola at the Aberdares, Hinde's Babbler near Nyeri, Olive Ibis, Abyssinian Crimsonwing, Scarlet-tufted Malachite Sunbird, Elgon Francolin and Abyssinian Ground Thrush at Mt Kenya, Masked Lark, Williams's Lark, Donaldson Smith's Sparrow Weaver and Grant's Wood Hoopoe at Shaba and Samburu, Star-spotted Nightjar at Marsabit, Jackson's Hornbill and Northern Masked Weaver at Lake Baringo, Stripe-breasted Seedeater near Kerio Valley, Jameson's Wattle-eye, Turner's Eremomela and Blue-headed Bee-eater at Kakamega, and Collared Lark and Bafirawari Flycatcher north of Garissa.

Our ten favourite birds were: (1) Collared Lark, (2) Elgon Francolin, (3) Scarlet-turfed Malachite Sunbird, (4) Fire-fronted Bishop and Friedmann's Lark, (6) Masked Lark, (7) Olive Ibis, (8) Black-faced Rufous Warbler, (9) Star-spotted Nightjar, and (10) Lesser Cuckoo.

Top mammals were: (1) Striped Hyaena, (2) Tana River Mangabey, (3) Grevy's Zebra, (4) Golden-rumped Giant Sengi, and (5) Gerenuk. Other noteworthy mammals included Southern Tree Hyrax, Somali Dwarf Mongoose, Aardwolf, Giant Forest Hog, Caracal, black Serval and Cheetah.

We started off with a morning in the grasslands of Nairobi National Park, with highlights including a flock of Jackson's Widowbird and a few Red-naped Widowbird, with the males in full breeding plumage. Stout Cisticola was common, Cuckoo Finch was seen at close range, Rosy-throated Longclaw put in an appearance, several Long-toed Lapwing were found, Speke's Weaver was breeding, and African Rail came out of hiding.

From Nairobi it was a short flight to Lamu, where we were deposited on Manda Island on a hot and humid afternoon. Shortly after touchdown we were watching Golden Palm Weaver and Malindi Pipit, and the rather 'different' calls of Sombre Greenbul amused us. A short walk through the arid scrub brought our first Somali Boubou, East Coast Boubou, Purple-banded Sunbird and a surprise Pale Batis. The next morning another stint of birding allowed us to study Somali Boubou vocalisations in detail, and we found also Ethiopian Swallow, Bearded Scrub Robin, Scaly Babbler, Coastal Cisticola, Three-streaked Tchagra, Bare-eyed Thrush and Black-headed Lapwing. Overhead circled a single Sooty Tern and Brown Noddy, and a few Sooty Gull frequented the town harbour.

Heading back to the mainland we were inconvenienced by an unannounced flight schedule change, but detouring back via Nairobi we arrived at Watamu late that night, without losing much time and in position for an early morning visit to Sokoke Forest the next day.

Arguably the most important patch of forest for birders along the entire east coast of the African continent, Sokoke Forest did not disappoint. Our highlights included two large flocks of Clarke's Weaver feeding in the woodlands that included many males in full breeding plumage, a couple of displaying Sokoke Pipit, point-blank Amani Sunbird, at least two Lesser Cuckoo, Red-throated Twinspot that fed quietly in the track, Lowland Tiny Greenbul, Little Yellow Flycatcher, East Coast Akalat, flocks of Chestnut-fronted Helmetshrike, Fischer's Turaco, Red-tailed Ant Thrush, Pallid Honeyguide, Scaly-throated Honeyguide, Mombasa Woodpecker, Plain-backed Sunbird, Forest Batis, and Golden-rumped Giant Sengi. After dark we enjoyed excellent views of Sokoke Scops Owl, although African Barred Owlet gave only the briefest of views.

Next on our agenda was a two-day diversion to the Tana River Primate Reserve, which few birders have ever visited. The drive was not too arduous and safety seemed well under control, although the state of the 'bandas' where we stayed for the night was far worse than described. Anyhow, we were met immediately on arrival by our main bird target, a male Violet-breasted Sunbird feeding in some flowering mistletoe. The species proved to be quite common in the dry bush, and we had ample opportunity to study it alongside Purple-banded Sunbird and Hunter's Sunbird. Although the dry bush was fairly unproductive, we also found Lilac-throated Roller, Fischer's Starling and Northern Crombec. However, most of our birding was done in and adjacent to gallery forest along the Tana River. Undoubted highlights included a large flock of Kenya Crested Guineafowl which we flushed up into and studied in the trees, Tana River Mangabey, Little Spotted Woodpecker, the curious fisheri race of Yellow-rumped Tinkerbird, Fischer's Greenbul and Tana River Red Colobus. Good numbers of waterbird included a single Dwarf Bittern. Arriving back at Malindi that evening we had just enough time for a short visit to the Sabaki River mouth where Madagascan Pratincole was noteworthy.

Heading inland the next morning the landscape gradually became greener. Large numbers of Common Cuckoo were on the move, and during the day we counted well over 200. We were surprised to find Grey Sunbird some 40 km inland, but the best birds of the drive to Tsavo East's Sala Gate were a breeding-plumage Steelblue Whydah and some Shelley's Starlings, and non-breeding Fire-fronted Bishop was also seen. By the time we arrived at Tsavo it was apparent that the area had received excellent rains and bird breeding was in full swing, with Singing Bush Lark, Red-winged Lark and Pink-breasted Lark in full display and song. Not too far into the park and a large flock of Fire-fronted Bishops was spotted near the road that included at least 20 striking males. Little did we realise that there were tens of flocks and hundreds of birds ahead, so we took our time to enjoy them looking at their best. The rest of our time in Tsavo East brought a wide range of species, including a surprise Quail Plover which showed very well beside the road, Grant's Wood Hoopoe (although they were accompanied with a single green-mantled bird), Red-naped Bushshrike, tens of Golden Pipits, Somali Courser, Black-faced Sandgrouse, Somali Bee-eater, Somali Ostrich, Pygmy Falcon, Amur Falcon, Southern Ground Hornbill and Black-bellied Sunbird.

Moving on from Tsavo East we paused at a roadside swamp with Zanzibar Red Bishop, Black-winged Red Bishop and African Golden Weaver breeding, before climbing up to the misty Taita Hills. During the afternoon and morning here we had good views of the three local endemics, Taita Thrush, Taita Apalis and Taita White-eye. Other goodies included Brown-breasted Barbet, Stripe-faced Greenbul, Placid Greenbul and Yellow-throated Woodland Warbler.

Heading back to the lowlands, the last stop on our eastern circuit was the Tsavo West area, were we stayed in a spectacularly-situated lodge. The open grasslands were full of White-winged Widowbird, Ashy Cisticola and Red-winged Lark, and Pangani Longclaw and Hartlaub's Bustard were more numerous than I have ever seen. Several male Harlequin Quail were also flushed. In the bushed areas we found Hildebrandt's Starling, Tsavo Sunbird, White-headed Mousebird, Blue-capped Cordon-bleu, showy Scaly Chatterer, Grey-headed Silverbill, Pringle's Puffback and Three-streaked Tchagra. However, our main target proved rather elusive, and only at the last available moment did we hear the distant whistles of a displaying Friedmann's Lark. With a bit of patience we managed to follow the calls until we tracked it down; it made occasional short flights to the top of bushes to sing, where it allowed detail study. And to cap things off we flushed a Corn Crake just as we were leaving, and spotted two Aardwolf, before returning to Nairobi to complete the eastern circuit!

The next day we were pleased to finally escape from Nairobi traffic after an overnight stay, and our first stop at Limuru Ponds turned up White-backed Duck among the many other waterbirds. As we climbed up to Kinangop we paused at some promising-looking roadside vegetation, where Lynes's Cisticola, a day-roosting Sombre/Dusky Nightjar, Long-billed Pipit and Schalow's Wheatear were found. At Kinangop we quickly located our main target, although it took some time before we all had good views of Sharpe's Longclaw, the job completed just in time to escape an approaching storm. Here too a flock of impressively long-tailed Long-tailed Widowbird showed off and some Levaillant's Cisticola perched on the roadside fence.

Cisticola, which proved to be very common in the open moorlands. Jackson's Francolin fed on the lawn in front of our lodge, and in the late afternoon we found a calling Striped Flufftail nearby. The next day a long drive through the moorlands failed to turn up either our hoped for sunbird or francolin, but we did see Malachite Sunbird, Eastern Double-collared Sunbird, Moorland Chat, Tacazze Sunbird and a black Serval. Descending through the forested zones roadside birds include Kandt's Waxbill, Kikuyu White-eye, Hunter's Cisticola and Abyssinian Crimsonwing, and we spotted some Giant Forest Hogs feeding in a clearing.

A brief stay down in the lowlands gave us good views of Hinde's Babbler, but it wasn't long before we were back up in the highlands, this time on the slopes of Mount Kenya, which during our trip we circumnavigated, partly ascended and visited at three different points. Forest birding was good, and highlights included perched Olive Ibis, Black-fronted Bushshrike, both Orange Ground Thrush and Abyssinian Ground Thrush, Thick-billed Seedeater, Scarce Swift, African Black Duck, Hartlaub's Turaco, Abyssinian Crimsonwing, White-headed Wood Hoopoe, Black-collared Apalis, Black-throated Apalis, White-eared Barbet, Brown-capped Weaver and Scaly Francolin. The most exciting section, however, was climbing to the rarely-visited alpine zone where we heard another four Striped Flufftail, watched several Scarlet-tufted Malachite Sunbird at close range, and, best of all, found a covey of six rarely-seen Elgon Francolin. At first their calls were distant, but we gradually closed in on them until we spotted them nearby. To our surprise they seemed fearless of man, and in the end they walked within five metres of us, giving incredible views. This meant that our planned trip to Mt Elgon was no longer necessary, and most significantly it gave us three days to play with at the end of the tour, for Collared Lark...

From Mt Kenya we moved north to the arid savannas of the Shaba, Samburu and Buffalo Springs area, where some of our first birds included **Somali Courser** and **Lichtenstein's S**andgrouse. On the first morning we headed out early to the lava plains of Shaba. **Donaldson Smith's Sparrow-Weaver** was common, and it didn't take us long to track down a few displaying **Williams's Larks**, which sat atop some lava rocks to give good scope views. Another plain turned up several **Masked Lark**, rarely seen in this part of Kenya! In the dry bush we found lots to keep us entertained, including **White-headed Mousebird**, **Vulturine Guineafowl**, **Black-bellied Sunbird**, **Black-capped Social Weaver**, **Parrot-billed Sparrow** and **Magpie Starling**, and **Yellow-vented Eremomela** and **Yellow-bellied Eremomela** in adjacent trees for an excellent comparison. *Grevy's Zebra* and *Gerenuk* were among the more popular mammals.

From the Shaba area we made a short visit north to Marsabit, and the Dida Galgalu Desert beyond. A new tarred road almost all the way there meant that the journey was quick and easy. Bushed areas en route held **Tiny Cisticola**, **Boran Cisticola**, **Somali Long-billed Crombec** and **Pygmy Batis**. A predawn start into the desert gave us a singing **Star-spotted Nightjar** in the spotlight, and once the sun rose the plains themselves held **Masked Lark**, **Greater Kestrel**, **Somali Crow**, **Chestnut-headed Sparrow-Lark**, **Crested Lark** and **Thekla Lark**.

Heading back south via the Samburu area and Mt Kenya we started our loop west, pausing for Cape/Mackinder's Eagle-Owl en route to Nakuru. Nakuru was rather underwhelming, with most flamingos departed for saltier water elsewhere, but we did see Coqui Francolin, Greater Painted-Snipe, Cape Teal, Horus Swift, White-headed Barbet and Little Sparrowhawk, and had an interesting encounter with a pair of Black Cuckoo, one of which was the normal black morph and the other the intermediate *jacksoni* morph.

Next on the cards was Lake Baringo, where we notched up all the target birds in record time.

Jackson's Hornbill visited us on our veranda as we were settling in, and just in front of our lodgings we found Northern Masked Weaver and Jackson's Golden-backed Weaver in full plumage. An afternoon owl excursion started off with African Scops Owl and Verreaux's Eagle-Owl, followed by four Northern White-faced Owl and a single Spotted Eagle-Owl that had yellow eyes but rather dark brown plumage of Greyish Eagle-Owl. We were also distracted by Brown-tailed Rock Chat and Mouse-coloured Penduline Tit, and the last bird of our busy day was Three-banded Courser.

From Baringo we made our way to Kakamega via the Kerio Valley. Some carefully searching eventually turned up five **Stripe-breasted Seedeaters**, not the most impressive species but interesting to see nonetheless. **White-crested Turaco** added a splash of colour.

On our first morning at Kakamega we found ourselves standing quietly in the forest under-storey listening to the mournful hoots of **Buff-spotted Flufftail** in the half light. It took some time, but as the light improved we managed to draw the said flufftail across a gap in the forest under-storey three times, for some good looks. As conditions further brightened we turned our attention to general forest birding, and before breakfast we'd seen **Jameson's Wattle-eye**, **Blue-headed Bee-eater** and **Turner's Eremomela**, although the latter two not that well. During the rest of the day we improved our views of the bee-eater and eremomela, and racked up a long list of other goodies, including **Ug**anda **Woodl**and **Warbler**, **Toro Olive Greenbul**, **Joyful Greenbul**, **Black-faced Rufous Warbler**, **Kakamega Greenbul**, **Ansorge's Greenbul**, **Brown-chested Alethe**, **Luehder's Bushshrike**, **Bocage's Bushshrike**, **Grey-throated Barbet** and **Red-chested Owlet**.

The final part of our journey now began, as we headed eastwards via Gatamaiyu Forest with Redfronted Parrot, Brown-chested Alethe, White-browed Crombec and Evergreen Forest Warbler and Thika with Brown-and-white Barbet and Brown-backed Honeybird in the garden, to Garissa. Good recent rains in the Garissa area made the roads rather muddy, but we managed to avoid getting stuck and after a few hours of bumping our way north we spotted our first Collared Lark in display. We took several hours to acquaint ourselves with these fantastic birds, watching at least five of them make numerous display flights, sing from the tops of bushes and forage on the ground. Here too we found several Bafirawari Flycatcher and studied them in detail. Other birds included Northern Grosbeak-Canary, Northern White-faced Owl, Pringle's Puffback, Somali Bunting, Yellowvented Eremomela, Pale Prinia, Three-banded Courser and Somali Long-billed Crombec. And a Striped Hyaena and several Somali Dwarf Mongoose were seen well near the road. All that remained now was a long drive back to Nairobi, with new birds en route including African Cuckoo-Hawk and Yellow-crowned Bishop.

They certainly have nothing to do with Moorland Francolin, with which they have been historically lumped

Crested Francolin *Dendroperdix sephaena*: Numerous sightings in both coastal (Kirk's Francolin *rovuma*) and inland areas (*grantii*)

Scaly Francolin *Pternistis squamatus*: Some excellent views at the Aberdares, Mt Kenya and Gatamaiyu (*maranensis*)

Hildebrandt's Francolin *Pternistis hildebrandti:* Heard at Nakuru (*altumi*)

Jackson's Francolin *Pternistis jacksoni*: Excellent views of many in the Aberdares, and also seen on Mt Kenya

Spotted Thick-knee Burhinus capensis: Recorded on three days, maculosus at Shaba and capensis in the Tsavo West area

Black-winged Stilt Himantopus himantopus: Seen at Nairobi National Park and Nakuru

Collared Pratincole Glareola pratincola: One in Tsavo East and quite a few north of Marsabit (fuelleborni)

Madagascan Pratincole Glareola ocularis: Seen at Sabaki River Mouth

Brown Noddy Anous stolidus: One over Manda (pileatus)

Grey-headed Gull Chroicocephalus cirrocephalus: Seen at Nakuru (poiocephalus)

Sooty Gull Ichthyaetus hemprichii: Seen at Lamu

Gull-billed Tern Gelochelidon nilotica: Seen at Nakuru (nilotica)

Sooty Tern Onychoprion fuscatus: One over Manda (nubilosus)

White-winged Tern Chlidonias leucopterus: Large numbers at Nakuru

Sandgrouse Family Pteroclidae

Chestnut-bellied Sandgrouse *Pterocles exustus*: Seen at Shaba and Marsabit area (*olivascens*)

Black-faced Sandgrouse Pterocles decoratus: Seen at Tsavo (decoratus), and Samburu, Buffalo Springs and Garissa area (ellenbecki)

Lichtenstein's Sandgrouse Pterocles lichtensteinii: Seen at Shaba (sukensis)

Pigeons, Doves Family Columbidae

Speckled Pigeon Columba guinea: Seen regularly (guinea)

African Olive Pigeon Columba arquatrix: Seen on Mt Kenya and at Gatamaiyu

Eastern Bronze-naped Pigeon Columba delegorguei: Seen on Mt Kenya (sharpei)

Lemon Dove Columba larvata: Heard at Taita Hills, Kakamega and Gatamaiyu (larvata)

Dusky Turtle Dove Streptopelia lugens: Seen in the highlands

Mourning Collared Dove Streptopelia decipiens: Seen regularly in small numbers, elegans in the east and perspicillata in the west

Red-eyed Dove Streptopelia semitorquata: Seen often

Ring-necked Dove Streptopelia capicola: Seen often, somalica in the north and tropica elsewhere

Laughing Dove Spilopelia senegalensis: Seen often (senegalensis)

Emerald-spotted Wood Dove Turtur chalcospilos: Seen often

Tambourine Dove Turtur tympanistria: Recorded on six days and seen well at Gatamaiyu

Namaqua Dove *Oena capensis:* Seen regularly (capensis)

African Green Pigeon Treron calvus: Seen at Sokoke (wakefieldii) and heard in the west (gibberifrons)

Turacos Family Musophagidae

Great Blue Turaco Corythaeola cristata: Seen at Kakamega

Ross's Turaco Musophaga rossae: Seen at Kakamega

Fischer's Turaco *Tauraco fischeri*: Great views at Sokoke (*fischeri*) White-crested Turaco *Tauraco leucolophus*: Seen well at Kerio Valley

Hartlaub's Turaco Tauraco hartlaubi: Seen often in the highlands

White-bellied Go-away-bird *Corythaixoides leucogaster*: Seen regularly

Cuckoos Family Cuculidae

Blue-headed Coucal Centropus monachus: Heard in the Aberdares (monachus)

White-browed Coucal *Centropus superciliosus*: Seen regularly (*superciliosus*)

Green Malkoha Ceuthmochares australis: Heard at Tana River Primate Reserve

Great Spotted Cuckoo Clamator glandarius: One in the Tsavo West area

Jacobin Cuckoo *Clamator jacobinus:* Seen mostly in coastal area, with large numbers migrating through Tsavo West (mostly *pica*, but perhaps also some *jacobinus*)

Diederik Cuckoo Chrysococcyx caprius: Seen regularly

Klaas's Cuckoo Chrysococcyx klaas: Recorded regularly

African Emerald Cuckoo Chrysococcyx cupreus: Heard on six dates

Black Cuckoo *Cuculus clamosus*: Seen well at Nakuru (*clamosus*) and Kerio Valley; one at Nakuru and the one at Kerio were of the intermediate subspecies *jacksoni*

Red-chested Cuckoo Cuculus solitarius: Great veiws at Nakuru and heard elsewhere

Lesser Cuckoo Cuculus poliocephalus: Excellent views at Sokoke, where one bird even called briefly

African Cuckoo Cuculus gularis: Heard a couple of times

Common Cuckoo *Cuculus canorus:* Incredible numbers seen moving through the Tsavo East area (>300), and seen in smaller numbers elsewhere (*canorus*)

Barn Owls Family Tytonidae

Western Barn Owl Tyto alba: Heard in Nairobi (affinis)

Owls Family Strigidae

Sokoke Scops Owl Otus ireneae: Great night-time views at Sokoke

African Scops Owl Otus senegalensis: Seen on the roost at Baringo (senegalensis)

Northern White-faced Owl Ptilopsis leucotis: Four seen on the roost at Baringo and another near Garissa

Cape Eagle-Owl Bubo capensis: Nice views at the known roost site en route to Nyaruhuru (Mackinder's Eagle-Owl mackinderi)

Spotted Eagle-Owl *Bubo africanus*: One seen well in the day at Baringo (*africanus*); it had yellow eyes but quite a brownish ground colour like Greyish Eagle-Owl, so perhaps a hybrid?

Verreaux's Eagle-Owl Bubo lacteus: Seen on the roost at Baringo

African Wood Owl Strix woodfordii: Seen at Tana River Primate Reserve (nigricantior)

Pearl-spotted Owlet Glaucidium perlatum: Seen twice (licua)

Red-chested Owlet Glaucidium tephronotum: Great views at Kakamega (elgonense)

African Barred Owlet Glaucidium capense: Heard at close range at Sokoke, where one was seen very briefly (scheffleri)

Nightjars Family Caprimulgidae

Sombre Nightjar Caprimulgus fraenatus: Great day time views en route to Kinangop

Fiery-necked Nightjar Caprimulgus pectoralis: Heard and seen at Sokoke (shelleyi)

Montane Nightjar Caprimulgus poliocephalus: Heard in the Aberdares and on Mt Kenya

Star-spotted Nightjar Caprimulgus stellatus: Heard and seen north of Marsabit

Slender-tailed Nightjar Caprimulgus clarus: Seen a few times, first on Manda

Swifts Family Apodidae

Scarce Swift Schoutedenapus myoptilus: Quite numerous on Mt Kenya (myoptilus)

African Palm Swift Cypsiurus parvus: Seen regularly, mostly laemostigma but also myochrous around Kakamega

Mottled Swift Tachymarptis aequatorialis: Seen a couple of times (aequatorialis)

Nyanza Swift Apus niansae: Our best views were at the Mackinder's Eagle-Owl spot (niansae)

Little Swift Apus affinis: Seen regularly (affinis)

Horus Swift Apus horus: Seen at Nakuru and Gatamaiyu (horus)

White-rumped Swift Apus caffer: Seen a few times

Mousebirds Family Coliidae

Speckled Mousebird Colius striatus: Seen regularly, with mombassicus in coastal areas and kikuyensis elsewhere

White-headed Mousebird Colius leucocephalus: Seen in the Tsavo West area (leucocephalus) and at Samburu (turneri)

Blue-naped Mousebird *Urocolius macrourus*: Seen regularly (pulcher)

Trogons Family Trogonidae

Narina Trogon Apaloderma narina: Heard in the Aberdares (narina)

Bar-tailed Trogon Apaloderma vittatum: Heard at Kakamega

Rollers Family Coraciidae

Purple Roller Coracias naevius: Seen a few times (naevius)

Lilac-breasted Roller Coracias caudatus: Seen regularly

Lilac-throated Roller Coracias lorti: Seen well at Tana River Primate Reserve

European Roller *Coracias garrulus:* Most numerous at Tsavo East (*garrulus*) Broad-billed Roller *Eurystomus glaucurus:* Seen once only (ssp. uncertain)

Kingfishers Family Alcedinidae

Grey-headed Kingfisher Halcyon leucocephala: Seen in small numbers (ssp. uncertain)

Brown-hooded Kingfisher Halcyon albiventris: Seen at Tana River Primate Reserve (orientalis)

Striped Kingfisher *Halcyon chelicuti*: Most conspicuous at Nakuru (*chelicuti*)

Woodland Kingfisher Halcyon senegalensis: Only at Lake Baringo (ssp. uncertain)

Mangrove Kingfisher Halcyon senegaloides: Heard at Manda

African Pygmy Kingfisher Ispidina picta: Seen a few times (picta)

Malachite Kingfisher Corythornis cristatus: Seen only twice (galeritus)

Giant Kingfisher Megaceryle maxima: Seen on four dates (maxima)

Pied Kingfisher Ceryle rudis: Seen on three dates (rudis)

Bee-eaters Family Meropidae

Blue-headed Bee-eater Merops muelleri: Brilliant views at Kakamega

Little Bee-eater Merops pusillus: Seen a few times (most or all cyanostictus)

Cinnamon-chested Bee-eater *Merops oreobates*: Seen often in the highlands

White-fronted Bee-eater Merops bullockoides: Seen at Nakuru

Somali Bee-eater Merops revoilii: Seen at Tsavo East, Shaba and Buffalo Springs

White-throated Bee-eater Merops albicollis: Most conspicuous at Shaba

Olive Bee-eater Merops superciliosus: Heard twice (superciliosus), although Blue-cheeked Bee-eater could not be ruled out

European Bee-eater Merops apiaster: Recorded on two days

Northern Carmine Bee-eater Merops nubicus: Seen in Tsavo East

Hoopoes Family Upupidae

African Hoopoe Upupa africana: Seen regularly in small numbers

Wood Hoopoes Family Phoeniculidae

White-headed Wood Hoopoe *Phoeniculus bollei*: Great views at Mt Kenya and Gatamaiyu (*jacksoni*)

Green Wood Hoopoe *Phoeniculus purpureus:* Seen a few times (marwitzi)

Grant's Wood Hoopoe *Phoeniculus granti:* One seen with two green-mantled birds at Tana River Primate Reserve, two seen with one green-mantled bird in Tsavo East, and six seen at Buffalo Springs

Common Scimitarbill *Rhinopomastus cyanomelas:* Seen at Manda (*schalowi*)

Abyssinian Scimitarbill *Rhinopomastus minor:* Seen regularly (cabanisi)

Hornbills Family Bucerotidae

Crowned Hornbill Tockus alboterminatus: Seen a few times, suahelicus in coastal areas and geloensis inland

African Grey Hornbill *Tockus nasutus*: Seen a few times (probably all *nasutus*)

Northern Red-billed Hornbill Tockus erythrorhynchus: Quite common

Eastern Yellow-billed Hornbill *Tockus flavirostris:* Seen a few times

Silvery-cheeked Hornbill Bycanistes brevis: Seen regularly

Southern Ground Hornbill Bucorvus leadbeateri: Seen at Tsavo East

Grey-throated Barbet Gymnobucco bonapartei: Seen at Kakamega (cinereiceps)

White-eared Barbet Stactolaema leucotis: Seen on Mt Kenya (kilimensis)

Green Barbet Stactolaema olivacea: Heard at Sokoke (olivacea)

Green Tinkerbird Pogoniulus simplex: Heard at Sokoke

Moustached Tinkerbird Pogoniulus leucomystax: Recorded on six dates

Yellow-rumped Tinkerbird *Pogoniulus bilineatus*: Seen well at Tana River Primate Reserve (*fischeri*) and Kakamega (*jacksoni*)

Red-fronted Tinkerbird *Pogoniulus pusillus*: Seen regularly (affinis)

Yellow-spotted Barbet Buccanodon duchaillui: Seen at Kakamega

Hairy-breasted Barbet Tricholaema hirsuta: Heard at Kakamega (ansorgii)

Red-fronted Barbet Tricholaema diademata: Recorded on three days (ssp. uncertain)

Spot-flanked Barbet Tricholaema lacrymosa: Seen regularly (probably all lacrymosa)

Black-throated Barbet *Tricholaema melanocephala*: Seen regularly (*stigmatothorax*)

White-headed Barbet Lybius leucocephalus: Seen well at Nakuru (albicauda)

Brown-and-white Barbet Lybius senex: Seen well at Thika

Brown-breasted Barbet Lybius melanopterus: Seen briefly at Taita Hills

Double-toothed Barbet Lybius bidentatus: Seen at Kerio Valley (aeguatorialis)

Yellow-billed Barbet *Trachyphonus purpuratus:* Heard at Kakamega (*elgonensis*)

Red-and-yellow Barbet *Trachyphonus erythrocephalus*: Seen well at Samburu (seemed intermediate between *erythrocephalus* and *versicolor*), and also in Tsavo West (*erythrocephalus*)

D'Arnaud's Barbet Trachyphonus darnaudii: Seen regularly, boehmi in the east and darnaudii in the west

Honeyguides Family Indicatoridae

Brown-backed Honeybird *Prodotiscus regulus:* Seen at Thika (regulus)

Pallid Honeyguide *Indicator meliphilus*: Good views of a calling bird at Sokoke (*meliphilus*), and two at Kakamega matched this species,

although did make us wonder about Willcock's Honeyguide

Lesser Honeyguide Indicator minor: Recorded twice (teitensis)

Scaly-throated Honeyguide Indicator variegatus: Seen well at Sokoke

Greater Honeyguide Indicator indicator: Recorded twice

Nubian Woodpecker Campethera nubica: Seen regularly (mostly nubica, but pallida at Manda)

Mombasa Woodpecker Campethera mombassica: Great views at Sokoke and Tana River Primate Reserve

Little Spotted Woodpecker Campethera cailliautii: Seen well at Tana River Primate Reserve and heard at Sokoke (cailliautii)

Buff-spotted Woodpecker Campethera nivosa: Seen well at Kakamega (herberti)

Cardinal Woodpecker *Dendropicos fuscescens*: Seen in small numbers (probably two or more ssp.)

Bearded Woodpecker *Dendropicos namaquus*: Seen a few times, *schoenis* at Samburu and *namaquus* at Gatamaiyu

Caracaras, Falcons Family Falconidae

Pygmy Falcon *Polihierax semitorquatus:* Seen regularly in small numbers (castanonotus)

Lesser Kestrel Falco naumanni: A few in Tsavo East

Common Kestrel Falco tinnunculus: Seen once (rufescens)

Greater Kestrel Falco rupicoloides: Good views north of Marsabit (fieldi)

Eurasian Hobby Falco subbuteo: Seen a few times (subbuteo)

Lanner Falcon Falco biarmicus: Seen on three dates, abyssinicus at Shaba and biarmicus at Tsavo West

Parrots Family Psittacidae

Red-fronted Parrot Poicephalus gulielmi: Perched birds seen well at Gatamaiyu, and seen also at Mt Kenya (massaicus)

Meyer's Parrot Poicephalus meyeri: Seen at Kerio Valley (saturatus)

Red-bellied Parrot Poicephalus rufiventris: Seen a few times (rufiventris)

Broadbills Family Eurylaimidae

African Broadbill Smithornis capensis: Heard at Kakamega (meinertzhageni)

Wattle-eyes, Batises Family Platysteiridae

African Shrike-flycatcher Megabyas flammulatus: Heard at Kakamega (aequatorialis)

Forest Batis *Batis mixta:* Seen well at Sokoke (*ultima*) Chinspot Batis *Batis molitor:* Widespread sightings (*puella*)

Pale Batis Batis soror: Seen at Manda and Sokoke

Eastern Black-headed Batis Batis minor: Seen at Manda and Tsavo East

Pygmy Batis Batis perkeo: Recorded on five days

Chestnut Wattle-eye Platysteira castanea: Seen at Kakamega

Brown-throated Wattle-eye *Platysteira cyanea*: Seen at Kakamega (*nyansae*) Jameson's Wattle-eye *Platysteira jamesoni*: Seen quite well at Kakamega

Helmetshrikes Family Prionopidae

White-crested Helmetshrike Prionops plumatus: Seen at Baringo (cristatus)

Retz's Helmetshrike *Prionops retzii*: Seen at Sokoke (*graculinus*)

Chestnut-fronted Helmetshrike *Prionops scopifrons*: Great views at Sokoke (kirki)

Bushshrikes Family Malaconotidae

Grey-headed Bushshrike Malaconotus blanchoti: Heard just once (approximans)

Black-fronted Bushshrike *Chlorophoneus nigrifrons*: Several good sightings in the central highlands (*nigrifrons*)

Bocage's Bushshrike Chlorophoneus bocagei: Seen at Kakamega (jacksoni)

Orange-breasted Bushshrike Chlorophoneus sulfureopectus: Recorded only on three days (similis)

Four-colored Bushshrike Telophorus quadricolor: Heard at Sokoke (nigricauda)

Doherty's Bushshrike Telophorus dohertyi: Heard at Mt Kenya

Rosy-patched Bushshrike Telophorus cruentus: cathemagmenus in the Tsavo area and hilgerti at Samburu

Brown-crowned Tchagra *Tchagra australis:* Seen on several days, including at Nairobi NP (emini)

Three-streaked Tchagra *Tchagra jamesi*: Great views at Manda (mandanus) and Tsavo West area (jamesi)

Black-crowned Tchagra *Tchagra senegalus*: Recorded only on three days (probably *orientalis*)

Black-backed Puffback Dryoscopus cubla: Seen well at Manda and Sokoke (affini), and in the Taita Hills (nairobiensis)

Pink-footed Puffback Dryoscopus angolensis: Seen at Kakamega (nandensis)

Northern Puffback Dryoscopus gambensis: Seen in the Kerio Valley (malzacii)

Pringle's Puffback Dryoscopus pringlii: Remarkably common in Tsavo West and around Garissa, and seen well at the latter locality

Slate-colored Boubou Laniarius funebris: Seen regularly

Lühder's Bushshrike Laniarius luehderi: Seen at Kakamega

Red-naped Bushshrike Laniarius ruficeps: Good views at Tsavo East and Tsavo West (rufinuchalis)

Brubru Nilaus afer: Seen regularly, massaicus in the west and central areas, and minor in the east

Taita Fiscal Lanius dorsalis: Seen in Tsavo West

Somali Fiscal *Lanius somalicus:* Seen north of Marsabit

Spotted-backed Weaver *Ploceus paroptus:* Seen in the Tsavo area (paroptus)

Clarke's Weaver Ploceus golandi: Brilliant views of two large flocks, including full-plumage males, at Sokoke

Golden-backed Weaver *Ploceus jacksoni*: Seen well at Baringo, where in full breeding plumage

Chestnut Weaver *Ploceus rubiginosus*: Seen regularly, with breeding plumage birds around Samburu (*rubiginosus*)

Dark-backed Weaver *Ploceus bicolor:* Seen in the coastal forests (*kersteni*) and at Kakamega (*mentalis*)

Brown-capped Weaver Ploceus insignis: Seen at Mt Kenya, Kakamega and Gatamaiyu

Red-headed Malimbe Malimbus rubricollis: Seen at Kakamega (rubricollis)

Red-headed Weaver Anaplectes rubriceps: A few good sightings (leuconotos)

Red-billed Quelea Quelea quelea: Many seen (aethiopica)

Yellow-crowned Bishop Euplectes afer: Breeding-plumage birds seen at Thika (ladoensis)

Fire-fronted Bishop Euplectes diadematus: Hundreds of breeding-plumage birds seen in Tsavo East

Zanzibar Red Bishop Euplectes nigroventris: Breeding-plumage birds seen in the Tsavo West area

Black-winged Red Bishop Euplectes hordeaceus: Breeding-plumage birds seen in the Tsavo West area (hordeaceus)

Yellow Bishop *Euplectes capensis:* Seen only twice (*crassirostris*)

White-winged Widowbird Euplectes albonotatus: Very conspicuous in the Tsavo West area (eques)

Red-naped Widowbird Euplectes suahelicus: Great views in Nairobi National Park (suahelicus)

Long-tailed Widowbird Euplectes progne: Great views at Kinangops (delamerei)

Jackson's Widowbird Euplectes jacksoni: Seen well at Nairobi National Park and the Mackinder's Eagle-Owl spot

Waxbills, Munias and allies Family Estrildidae

Grey-headed Nigrita Nigrita canicapillus: Seen at Mt Kenya (diabolicus) and Kakamega (schistaceus)

White-breasted Nigrita Nigrita fusconotus: Heard at Kakamega (fusconotus)

Green-winged Pytilia Pytilia melba: Several sightings (soudanensis)

Cut-throat Finch *Amadina fasciata*: Seen at Shaba and Samburu (*alexanderi*)

Abyssinian Crimsonwing Cryptospiza salvadorii: Seen at Aberdares and Mt Kenya (kilimensis)

Red-throated Twinspot *Hypargos niveoguttatus*: Great views at Sokoke (*macrospilotus*)

Red-billed Firefinch Lagonosticta senegala: Seen regularly (ruberrima)

Red-cheeked Cordon-bleu Uraeginthus bengalus: Seen regularly, including at Baring (bengalus), Nairobi (brunneigularis) and Lamu (littoralis)

Blue-capped Cordon-bleu Uraeginthus cyanocephalus: Several good sightings

Purple Grenadier Uraeginthus ianthinogaster: Several good sightings

Yellow-bellied Waxbill Coccopygia quartinia: Seen in the highland forests (kilimensis)

Crimson-rumped Waxbill Estrilda rhodopyga: Seen well at Tsavo West and Baringo (centralis)

Common Waxbill Estrilda astrild: Seen a few times in central areas (massaica)

Kandt's Waxbill Estrilda kandti: Seen well at Aberdares and Mt Kenya (keniensis)

Black-cheeked Waxbill Estrilda charmosyna: Seen at Shaba and Garissa (charmosyna)

African Silverbill Euodice cantans: Seen at Shaba and Samburu (orientalis)

Grey-headed Silverbill Odontospiza caniceps: Great views in the Tsavo West area

Bronze Mannikin Lonchura cucullata: Seen several times, cucullata at Kakamega and scutata in the east

Red-backed Mannikin *Lonchura nigriceps*: Common in the highlands

Indigobirds, Whydahs Family Viduidae

Village Indigobird *Vidua chalybeata*: Seen between Malindi and Tsavo East (*amauropteryx* with a red bill), and in the Tsavo West area (*centralis* with a white bill)

Pin-tailed Whydah Vidua macroura: Seen a few times

Steel-blue Whydah Vidua hypocherina: Fantastic views of a breeding-plumage male between Malindi and Tsavo East

Straw-tailed Whydah Vidua fischeri: Seen on three dates

Long-tailed Paradise Whydah Vidua paradisaea: Seen at Tsavo East and Garissa

Cuckoo-finch Anomalospiza imberbis: Males and females seen well at Nairobi National Park

Wagtails, Pipits Family Motacillidae

Cape Wagtail Motacilla capensis: Seen at Limuru Ponds (wellsi)

Mountain Wagtail Motacilla clara: Seen at Mt Kenya (torrentium)

African Pied Wagtail Motacilla aguimp: Seen regularly (vidua)

Golden Pipit Tmetothylacus tenellus: Many in Tsavo East, and seen again at Shaba

Sharpe's Longclaw Macronyx sharpei: Three seen well at Kinangop

Yellow-throated Longclaw Macronyx croceus: Seen at Nairobi National Park and Nakuru

Pangani Longclaw Macronyx aurantiigula: Great views of many in the Tsavo West area

Rosy-throated Longclaw *Macronyx ameliae*: Seen at Nairobi National Park

African Pipit Anthus cinnamomeus: Seen at Mt Kenya and a few other times (lacuum)

Long-billed Pipit Anthus similis: Seen well en route to Kinangop and at Nakuru (chyuluensis)

Plain-backed Pipit Anthus leucophrys: Seen at Nakuru (goodsoni)

Tree Pipit Anthus trivialis: Recorded at Nairobi National Park (trivialis)

Striped Pipit Anthus lineiventris: Heard at Taita Hills

Sokoke Pipit Anthus sokokensis: Seen a couple of times at Sokoke

Malindi Pipit Anthus melindae: Great views at Manda and Sokoke (melindae)

Finches Family Fringillidae

African Citril Crithagra citrinelloides: Seen in the central highlands (kikuyensis)

Southern Citril Crithagra hyposticta: Seen around Kakamega (brittoni)

Reichenow's Seedeater Crithagra reichenowi: Seen several times

Yellow-fronted Canary Crithagra mozambica: Seen along the coast (mozambica)

White-bellied Canary Crithagra dorsostriata: Seen a few times (ssp. uncertain)

Northern Grosbeak-Canary Crithagra donaldsoni: Seen in the Garissa area

Southern Grosbeak-Canary Crithagra buchanani: Heard in the Tsavo West area

Brimstone Canary Crithagra sulphurata: Recorded on four days (sharpii)

Stripe-breasted Seedeater Crithagra striatipecta: Good views of at least five as we neared Kerio Valley

Thick-billed Seedeater Crithagra burtoni: Seen at Mt Kenya (albifrons) and Kakamega (kilimensis)

Streaky Seedeater Crithagra striolata: Seen regularly in the highlands (striolata)

Yellow-crowned Canary Serinus flavivertex: Seen in the highlands (flavivertex)

Buntings Family Emberizidae

Cinnamon-breasted Bunting *Emberiza tahapisi:* Just one sighting (*tahapisi*)
Somali Bunting *Emberiza poliopleura:* Especially common north of Garissa, but seen reguarly in arid areas Golden-breasted Bunting *Emberiza flaviventris:* Seen a few times (*kalaharica*)
